REVIEW CRITERIA FOR NEW INSTITUTIONAL HEALTH SERVICES

N.C. Gen. Stat. §131E-183(a) The Agency shall review all applications utilizing the criteria outlined in this subsection and shall determine that an application is either consistent with or not in conflict with these criteria before a certificate of need for the proposed project shall be issued.

(1) The proposed project shall be consistent with applicable policies and need determinations in the State Medical Facilities Plan, the need determination of which constitutes a determinative limitation on the provision of any health service, health service facility, health service facility beds, dialysis stations, operating rooms, or home health offices that may be approved.

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DVA Renal Healthcare, Inc. d/b/a Mt Olive Dialysis (the applicant) proposes to add three dialysis stations to the existing facility, Mt. Olive Dialysis, for a total of 23 dialysis stations upon completion of this project and Project I.D. #P-11684-19 (add three stations).

Need Determination

The 2019 State Medical Facilities Plan (SMFP) provides a county need methodology and a facility need methodology for determining the need for new dialysis stations. According to the July 2019 Semiannual Dialysis Report (SDR), the county need methodology shows there is no county need determination for Wayne County. However, the applicant is eligible to apply for additional stations in its existing facility based on the facility need methodology because

the utilization rate reported for Mt. Olive Dialysis in the July 2019 SDR is 4.2667 patients per station per week. This utilization rate was calculated based on 64 in-center dialysis patients and 15 certified dialysis stations as of December 31, 2018 (64 patients /15 stations = 4.2667 patients per station per week). [Note: In Project I.D. # P-11598-18, the applicant was approved to add two stations for a total of 17 stations. Those two additional stations were certified effective May 21, 2019]. Application of the facility need methodology indicates that three additional stations are needed for this facility, as illustrated in the following table.

As shown in the table above, based on the facility need methodology for dialysis stations, the potential number of stations needed is three stations. Rounding to the nearest whole number is allowed in Step (v) of the facility need methodology, as stated in the July 2019 SDR. Step (C) of the facility need methodology states, *"The facility may apply to expand to meet the need established ..., up to a maximum of ten stations."* The applicant proposes to add three new stations and, therefore, is consistent with the facility need determination for dialysis stations.

Policies

There is one policy in the 2019 SMFP which is applicable to this review: *Policy GEN-3: Basic Principles*, on page 31 of the 2019 SMFP, is applicable to this review because the facility need methodology is applicable to this review. Policy GEN-3 states:

"A certificate of need applicant applying to develop or offer a new institutional health service for which there is a need determination in the North Carolina State Medical Facilities Plan shall demonstrate how the project will promote safety and quality in the delivery of health care services while promoting equitable access and maximizing healthcare value for resources expended. A certificate of need applicant shall document its plans for providing access to services for patients with limited financial resources and demonstrate the availability of capacity to provide these services. A certificate of need applicant shall also document how its projected volumes incorporate these concepts in meeting the need identified in the State Medical Facilities Plan as well as addressing the needs of all residents in the proposed service area."

The applicant addresses *Policy GEN-3* as follows:

<u>Promote Safety and Quality</u> – The applicant describes how it believes the proposed project would promote safety and quality in Section B.3(a), pages 12-13, Section N, page 48, and Section O, page 50. The information provided by the applicant is reasonable and adequately supports the determination that the applicant's proposal would promote safety and quality.

<u>Promote Equitable Access</u> – The applicant describes how it believes the proposed project would promote equitable access in Section B.3(b), page 13, Section C.7, page 22, Section L, pages 43-45, and Section N, page 48. The information provided by the applicant is reasonable and adequately supports the determination that the applicant's proposal would promote equitable access.

<u>Maximize Healthcare Value</u> – The applicant describes how it believes the proposed project would maximize healthcare value in Section B.3(c) and (d), pages 13-14, Section K, pages 40-41, Section N.1, page 48 and Section Q. The information provided by the applicant is reasonable and adequately supports the determination that the applicant's proposal would maximize healthcare value.

The applicant adequately demonstrates how its projected volumes incorporate the concepts of quality, equitable access and maximum value for resources expended in meeting the facility need as identified by the applicant. The application is consistent with Policy GEN-3.

Based on that review, the Agency concludes that the application is conforming to this criterion for the reasons stated above.

all residents of the area, and, in particular, low income persons, racial and ethnic minorities, women, handicapped persons, the elderly, and other underserved groups are likely to have access to the services proposed.

The applicant proposes to add three dialysis stations to the existing facility, Mt. Olive Dialysis, for a total of 23 dialysis stations upon completion of this project and Project I.D. #P-11598-18 (add two stations).

Patient Origin

On page 369, the 2019 SMFP defines the service area for dialysis stations as "...the dialysis station planning area in which the dialysis station is located. Except for the Cherokee-Clay-Graham Multicounty Planning Area and the Avery-Mitchell-Yancey Multicounty Planning Area, each of the 94 remaining counties is a separate dialysis station planning area." Thus, the service area is Wayne County. Facilities may also serve residents of counties not included in their service area.

In Section C, pages 18-20, the applicant provides the assumptions and methodology used to project its patient origin. The applicant's assumptions are reasonable and adequately supported.

Analysis of Need

In Section C, pages 18-20, the applicant explains why it believes the population projected to utilize the proposed services needs the proposed services. In Section B.2, page 10, the applicant states the application is filed pursuant to the facility need methodology in the 2019 SMFP utilizing data from the July 2019 SDR.

- The July 2019 SDR shows that Mt. Olive Dialysis operated at a utilization rate of 106.7 percent (4.2667 patients per station per week) as of December 31, 2018 and had 64 incenter patients. The applicant states that 50 of the 64 patients were residents of Wayne County with 14 patients residing in other counties.
- The applicant projects the first full operating year of the project will be January 1, 2021 – December 31, 2021 (CY2021) and the second full operating year will be January 1, 2022 – December 31, 2022 (CY2022).
- The applicant begins the projections for the future patient population of Mt. Olive Dialysis by using the ending in-center patient census of 50 patients from Wayne County, as of December 31, 2018.
- The applicant uses the Five-Year Average Annual Change Rate (AACR) for Wayne County which is 6.5%, as published in the July 2019 SDR, to project the Wayne County patient population forward.
- The applicant does not project an increase in the 14 patients who utilize the facility and live in other counties.
- The applicant adds the two dialysis stations approved to be added to the Mt. Olive Dialysis facility per Project I.D. #P-11598-18 and the three dialysis stations approved to be added to the Mt. Olive Dialysis facility per Project I.D. #P-11684-19.
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Projected Utilization

In Section C, page 20, the applicant provides projected utilization as summarized in the following table.

The applicant states on page 20 that the number of projected patients for OY1 and OY2 is rounded down to the nearest whole number. Therefore, at the end of OY1 (CY2021) and OY2 (CY2022) the facility is projected to serve 74 and 78 in-center patients, respectively.

The projected utilization rates for the first two operating years are as follows:

- OY1: 3.2 patients per station per week, or 80.0% (74 patients / 23 stations = 3.2/4 = 0.8 or 80.0%).
- OY2: 3.4 patients per station per week, or 84.8% (78 patients/23 stations = 3.4/4 = 0.848 or 84.8%).

The projected utilization at the end of OY1 meets the minimum standard of 3.2 in-center patients per station per week required by 10A NCAC 14C .2203(b).

Projected utilization is reasonable and adequately supported for the following reasons:

- The applicant starts with the 50 existing Wayne County patients.
- The Wayne County patients are projected to increase based on 6.5% per year which is the Five Year AACR for Wayne County as reported in Table D of the July 2019 SDR.
- The applicant projects no growth for patients who utilize the facility and live in other counties.

Access

In Section C, page 15, the applicant states:

"By policy, the proposed services will be made available to all residents in its service area without qualifications. The facility will serve patients without regard to race, sex, age, or handicap. We will serve patients regardless of ethnic or socioeconomic situation.

We will make every reasonable effort to accommodate all patients, especially those with special needs such as handicapped, patients attending school or patients who work. Dialysis services will be provided six days per week with two patient shifts per day to accommodate patient need.

Mt. Olive Dialysis will help uninsured/underinsured patients with identifying and applying for financial assistance; therefore services are available to all patients including low income persons, racial and ethnic minorities, women, handicapped, elderly, and other under-served persons."

In Section L, page 45, the applicant projects the following payor mix during the second full fiscal year of operation following completion of the project, as illustrated in the following table.

The projected payor mix is reasonable and adequately supported.

Conclusion

The Agency reviewed the:

- Application
- Exhibits to the application
- Information which was publicly available during the review and used by the Agency

Based on that review, the Agency concludes that the application is conforming to this criterion for the following reasons:

- The applicant adequately identifies the population to be served.
- The applicant adequately explains why the population to be served needs the services proposed in this application.
- Projected utilization is reasonable and adequately supported.

- The applicant projects the extent to which all residents, including underserved groups, will have access to the proposed services (payor mix) and adequately supports its assumptions.
- (3a) In the case of a reduction or elimination of a service, including the relocation of a facility or a service, the applicant shall demonstrate that the needs of the population presently served will be met adequately by the proposed relocation or by alternative arrangements, and the effect of the reduction, elimination or relocation of the service on the ability of low income persons, racial and ethnic minorities, women, handicapped persons, and other underserved groups and the elderly to obtain needed health care.

NA

The applicant does not propose to reduce a service, eliminate a service or relocate a facility. Therefore, Criterion (3a) is not applicable to this review.

(4) Where alternative methods of meeting the needs for the proposed project exist, the applicant shall demonstrate that the least costly or most effective alternative has been proposed.

CA

The applicant proposes to add three dialysis stations to the existing facility, Mt. Olive Dialysis, for a total of 23 dialysis stations upon completion of this project and Project I.D. #P-11684-19 (add three stations).

In Section E, page 27, the applicant describes the alternatives it considered and explains why each alternative is either more costly or less effective than the alternative proposed in this application to meet the need. The alternatives considered were:

- *Maintain the Status Quo* The applicant states that maintaining the status quo is not an effective alternative because of the growth rate at the facility.
- *Relocate Stations from another DaVita* Two of the four operational DaVita dialysis facilities in Wayne County are operating at less than 80.0%. However, the applicant states transferring stations from either of these two facilities is not the most effective alternative. Three dialysis stations are approved to be relocated from Goldsboro South to another DaVita facility in Wayne County, Rosewood Dialysis (Project I.D. #011451-18). The other facility, Coastal Plains Dialysis, is a new facility that was certified in January 2018, and utilization at the facility is still ramping up.

On page 27, the applicant states that its proposal is the most effective alternative because:

- The proposed project will proactively address both the issues of growth and access to the facility.
- Developing a third shift is inconvenient for patients and if a facility is at its maximum capacity that eliminates patient choice.

The applicant adequately demonstrates that the alternative proposed in this application is the most effective alternative to meet the need for the following reasons:

- The application is conforming to all statutory and regulatory review criteria.
- The applicant provides credible information to explain why it believes the proposed project is the most effective alternative.

Conclusion

The Agency reviewed the:

- Application
- Exhibits to the application

Based on that review, the Agency concludes that the application is conforming to this criterion for the reasons stated above. Therefore, the application is approved subject to the following conditions:

- **1. DVA Renal Healthcare, Inc. shall materially comply with all representations made in the certificate of need application.**
- 2. Pursuant to the facility need determination in the July 2019 SDR, DVA Renal Healthcare, Inc. shall develop no more than three additional dialysis stations for a total of no more than 23 certified stations at Mt. Olive Dialysis upon completion of this project and Project I.D. #P-11684-19 (add three stations), which shall include any home hemodialysis training or isolation stations.
- **3.** DVA Renal Healthcare, Inc. shall acknowledge acceptance of and agree to comply with all conditions stated herein to the Agency in writing prior to issuance of the certificate of need.
- (5) Financial and operational projections for the project shall demonstrate the availability of funds for capital and operating needs as well as the immediate and long-term financial feasibility of the proposal, based upon reasonable projections of the costs of and charges for providing health services by the person proposing the service.

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The applicant proposes to add three dialysis stations to the existing facility, Mt. Olive Dialysis, for a total of 23 dialysis stations upon completion of this project and Project I.D. #P-11684-19 (add three stations).

Capital and Working Capital Costs

In Section Q, Form F.1a, the applicant projects the total capital cost of the project as shown in the table below.

Exhibit F contains a letter dated September 12, 2019 from the Chief Accounting Officer for DaVita Inc., parent company to DVA Renal Healthcare, Inc., authorizing the use of accumulated reserves for the capital needs of the project. Exhibit F also contains a copy of the Consolidated Balance Sheets from DaVita, Inc., for year ending December 31, 2018. DaVita, Inc. had adequate cash and assets to fund the capital cost of the proposed project.

Financial Feasibility

The applicant provided pro forma financial statements for the first three full fiscal years of operation following completion of the project. In Section Q, Form F.2, the applicant projects that revenues will exceed operating expenses in the first two full fiscal years of operation of the project, as shown in the table below.

- The applicant adequately demonstrates sufficient funds for the operating needs of the proposal and that the financial feasibility of the proposal is based upon reasonable projections of costs and charges.
- 6) The applicant shall demonstrate that the proposed project will not result in unnecessary duplication of existing or approved health service capabilities or facilities.

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The applicant proposes to add three dialysis stations to the existing facility, Mt. Olive Dialysis, for a total of 23 dialysis stations upon completion of this project and Project I.D. #P-11684-19 (add three stations).

On page 369, the 2019 SMFP defines the service area for dialysis stations as "... the dialysis station planning area in which the dialysis station is located. Except for the Cherokee-Clay-Graham Multicounty Planning Area and the Avery-Mitchell-Yancey Multicounty Planning Area, each of the 94 remaining counties is a separate dialysis station planning area." Thus, the service area is Wayne County. Facilities may also serve residents of counties not included in their service area.

DaVita operates five of the six dialysis facilities (existing or approved) in Wayne County, as shown below.

In Section G, page 33, the applicant explains why it believes its proposal would not result in the unnecessary duplication of existing or approved dialysis services in Wayne County. The applicant states:

"While adding stations at this facility does increase the number of stations in Wayne County, it is based on the facility need methodology. It ultimately serves to meet the needs of the facility's growing population of patients referred by the facility's admitting nephrologists. The addition of stations, therefore, serves to increase capacity rather than duplicate any existing or approved services in the service area."

The applicant adequately demonstrates that the proposal would not result in an unnecessary duplication of existing or approved services in the service area for the following reasons:

- There is a facility need determination for the proposed three additional dialysis stations as calculated using the methodology in the July 2019 SDR.
- The applicant adequately demonstrates that the proposed three dialysis stations are needed in addition to the existing or approved dialysis facilities in Wayne County.

Conclusion

The Agency reviewed the:

- Application
- Exhibits to the application

Based on that review, the Agency concludes that the application is conforming to this criterion for the reasons stated above.

(7) The applicant shall show evidence of the availability of resources, including health manpower and management personnel, for the provision of the services proposed to be provided.

In Section H.4, page 36, the applicant identifies the current medical director. In Exhibit H, the applicant provides a letter from the medical director indicating an interest in continuing to serve as medical director for the proposed services. In Exhibits H and I, the applicant provides supporting documentation.

The applicant adequately demonstrates the availability of sufficient health manpower and management personnel to provide the proposed services.

Based on that review, the Agency concludes that the application is conforming to this criterion for the reasons stated above.

(8) The applicant shall demonstrate that the provider of the proposed services will make available, or otherwise make arrangements for, the provision of the necessary ancillary and support services. The applicant shall also demonstrate that the proposed service will be coordinated with the existing health care system.

Furthermore, the applicant does not project to provide the proposed services to a substantial number of persons residing in other states that are not adjacent to the North Carolina county in which the services will be offered. Therefore, Criterion (9) is not applicable to this review.

- (10) When applicable, the applicant shall show that the special needs of health maintenance organizations will be fulfilled by the project. Specifically, the applicant shall show that the project accommodates: (a) The needs of enrolled members and reasonably anticipated new members of the HMO for the health service to be provided by the organization; and (b) The availability of new health services from non-HMO providers or other HMOs in a reasonable and cost-effective manner which is consistent with the basic method of operation of the HMO. In assessing the availability of these health services from these providers, the applicant shall consider only whether the services from these providers:
 - (i) would be available under a contract of at least 5 years duration;
 - (ii) would be available and conveniently accessible through physicians and other health professionals associated with the HMO;
 - (iii) would cost no more than if the services were provided by the HMO; and
 - (iv) would be available in a manner which is administratively feasible to the HMO.

The applicant is not an HMO. Therefore, Criterion (10) is not applicable to this review.

Based on that review, the Agency concludes that the applicant adequately documents the extent to which medically underserved populations currently use the applicant's existing services in comparison to the percentage of the population in the applicant's service area which is medically underserved. Therefore, the application is conforming to this criterion.

(b) Its past performance in meeting its obligation, if any, under any applicable regulations requiring provision of uncompensated care, community service, or access by minorities and handicapped persons to programs receiving federal assistance, including the existence of any civil rights access complaints against the applicant;

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In Section L.2, page 44, the applicant states it does not have any obligation to provide uncompensated care, community service or access by minorities and persons with disabilities.

In Section L.2, page 44, the applicant states that during the last five years no patient civil rights access complaints have been filed against the facility or any similar facilities owned by the applicant or a related entity and located in North Carolina.

As shown in the table above, during the second full fiscal year of operation, the applicant projects that 76.6% of total services will be provided to Medicare patients and 15.6% to Medicaid patients.

On page 45, the applicant provides the assumptions and methodology used to project payor mix during the second full fiscal years of operation following completion of the project. The projected payor mix is reasonable and adequately supported because the applicant's proposed patient origin is comparable to its historical patient origin.

(d) That the applicant offers a range of means by which a person will have access to its services. Examples of a range of means are outpatient services, admission by house staff, and admission by personal physicians.

- (18a) The applicant shall demonstrate the expected effects of the proposed services on competition in the proposed service area, including how any enhanced competition will have a positive impact upon the cost effectiveness, quality, and access to the services proposed; and in the case of applications for services where competition between providers will not have a favorable impact on cost-effectiveness, quality, and access to the services proposed, the applicant shall demonstrate that its application is for a service on which competition will not have a favorable impact.

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The applicant proposes to add three dialysis stations to the existing facility, Mt. Olive Dialysis, for a total of 23 dialysis stations upon completion of this project and Project I.D. #P-11684-19 (add three stations).

On page 369, the 2019 SMFP defines the service area for dialysis stations as "...the dialysis station planning area in which the dialysis station is located. Except for the Cherokee-Clay-Graham Multicounty Planning Area and the Avery-Mitchell-Yancey Multicounty Planning Area, each of the 94 remaining counties is a separate dialysis station planning area." Thus, the service area is Wayne County. Facilities may also serve residents of counties not included in their service area.

DaVita operates five of the six dialysis facilities (existing or approved) in Wayne County, as shown below.

In Section N, page 48, the applicant describes the expected effects of the proposed services on competition in the service area and discusses how any enhanced competition in the service area will promote the cost-effectiveness, quality and access to the proposed services. On page 48, the applicant states:

"The expansion of Mt. Olive Dialysis will have no effect on competition in Wayne County. Although the addition of stations at this facility could serve to provide more patients another option to select a provider that gives them the highest quality service and better meets their needs, this project primarily serves to address the needs of a population already served (or projected to be served, based on historical growth rates) by DaVita."

The applicant adequately describes the expected effects of the proposed services on competition in the service area and adequately demonstrates:

- The cost-effectiveness of the proposal (see Sections F and Q of the application and any exhibits)
- Quality services will be provided (see Section O of the application and any exhibits)
- Access will be provided to underserved groups (see Section L of the application and any exhibits)

Conclusion

Based on that review, the Agency concludes that the application is conforming to this criterion for the reasons stated above.

- (20) An applicant already involved in the provision of health services shall provide evidence that quality care has been provided in the past.

In Section Q, Form A, the applicant indicates DaVita Inc. owns and operates over 100 dialysis facilities in North Carolina. Form A provides a list of those facilities.

In Section O.2, page 50, and Exhibit O, the applicant states that DHSR or CMS identified one incident of immediate jeopardy at one of these facilities, Waynesville Dialysis Center, during the 18 months immediately preceding the submittal of the application. The applicant provides documentation regarding the deficiency and subsequent measures taken by the facility to ensure compliance with CMS Conditions for Coverage in Exhibit O. The applicant states that all of the problems have been corrected and that Waynesville Dialysis Center is back in compliance as of June 7, 2019. After reviewing and considering information provided by the applicant and considering the quality of care provided at all DaVita facilities, the applicant provided sufficient evidence that quality care has been provided in the past. Therefore, the application is conforming to this criterion.

- (b) The Department is authorized to adopt rules for the review of particular types of applications that will be used in addition to those criteria outlined in subsection (a) of this section and may vary according to the purpose for which a particular review is being conducted or the type of health service reviewed. No such rule adopted by the Department shall require an academic medical center teaching hospital, as defined by the State Medical Facilities Plan, to demonstrate that any facility or service at another hospital is being appropriately utilized in order for that academic medical center teaching hospital to be approved for the issuance of a certificate of need to develop any similar facility or service.

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The application is conforming with all applicable Criteria and Standards for End Stage Renal Disease Services promulgated in 10A NCAC 14C .2200. The specific criteria are discussed below.

10 NCAC 14C .2203 PERFORMANCE STANDARDS

- (a) An applicant proposing to establish a new End Stage Renal Disease facility shall document the need for at least 10 stations based on utilization of 3.2 patients per station per week as of the end of the first operating year of the facility, with the exception that the performance standard shall be waived for a need in the State Medical Facilities Plan that is based on an adjusted need determination.
- -NA- The applicant is not proposing to establish a new ESRD facility.
- (b) An applicant proposing to increase the number of dialysis stations in an existing End Stage Renal Disease facility or one that was not operational prior to the beginning of the review period but which had been issued a certificate of need shall document the need for the additional stations based on utilization of 3.2 patients per station per week as of the end of the first operating year of the additional stations.

- -C- In Section C, pages 19-20, the applicant demonstrates that Mt. Olive Dialysis will serve a total of 74 in-center patients at the end of OY1 (CY2021) for a utilization rate of 80.4% or 3.217 patients per station per week (74 patients / 23 stations = 3.217/4 = 0.8043 or 80.4%). The discussion regarding projected utilization found in Criterion (3) is incorporated herein by reference.
- (c) An applicant shall provide all assumptions, including the methodology by which patient utilization is projected.
- -C- In Section C, pages 19-20, the applicant provides the assumptions and methodology used to project utilization of the facility.
